Introduction

The European Training Foundation (ETF) is the EU agency dedicated to supporting human capital development (HCD) in EU Enlargement countries and other EU neighbouring countries, in alignment with EU objectives. Ukraine remains a priority country for ETF.

With nearly 30 years of collaborative efforts, the ETF has established itself as a trusted partner to Ukrainian authorities and international organisations, focusing on strengthening education systems, enhancing training opportunities, and improving labour market dynamics.

ETF's current commitment to Ukraine's socio-economic development and EU integration is implemented through its Ukraine Task Force, which includes experienced Human Capital Development specialist, some of whom are Ukrainian nationals.

The aim is to support recovery, address emergencies, and facilitate Ukraine's EU accession process.

This document provides a systematic overview of key resources prepared by the ETF to support various aspects of human capital development in Ukraine.

The selected resources – reports, studies, analyses, fiches and key articles – are published between 2019 and 2024.

They are systematised in relation to 11 key segments of human capital development and specific ETF support activities. For each segment a brief overview is provided together with links to the material offering a reference to existing and ETF materials relevant to Ukraine. Furthermore, indications of forthcoming reports and studies are provided.

1. ETF support to Ukraine - website and key articles

2. Analysing education, training and employment

Collecting information on human capital development and employment is fundamental for informed policymaking and effective governance. By providing transparent and up-to-date information, these initiatives empower decision-makers to formulate evidence-based policies, foster collaboration among stakeholders, and ultimately drive positive change in Ukraine's education, training, and employment sectors.

The ETF Country Fiches, titled 'Education, Training, and Employment Developments,' serve as annual portraits of Ukraine's progress in these critical areas. These documents are made accessible on the ETF website in both English and Ukrainian, ensuring wide dissemination and



comprehension. The 2024 Ukraine Country Fiche will be drafted in Autumn 2024 and published by January 2025.

The ETF supports monitoring policy progress and building evidence on human capital development by expanding and refining statistics to meet EU frameworks. This includes using data from sources like the Labour Force Survey, Adult Education Survey, PISA, and Labour Market Policy statistics. These efforts improve NEET data accuracy, identify skills mismatches, and ease school-to-work transitions.

The ETF Country Fiches, titled 'Education, Training, and Employment Developments,' serve as annual portraits of Ukraine's progress in these critical areas.

The ETF Statistical Office plays a key role in gathering and disseminating crucial data pertaining to human capital development in Ukraine. This comprehensive data collection effort spans various facets of education, training, and employment, providing policymakers, researchers, and stakeholders with valuable insights into the country's evolving human capital landscape. As in previous years, the ETF will also supply KIESE data for the preparation of the annual Country Fiche for Ukraine.

Platform work in Ukraine is growing, offering flexible job opportunities through digital platforms. While it provides diverse employment options, concerns about labour rights and regulation persist. Balancing benefits and challenges is essential for fair and inclusive practices.

Since 2020, the European Training Foundation's 'Future of Skills' studies have analyzed changing job roles and skill demands, including in Ukraine's healthcare sector. Using traditional research and Big Data analytics, these studies reveal emerging skill needs and guide education and training systems.

3. The ETF Torino Process

The ETF collaborates closely with Ukraine's Ministry of Education and Science (MoES) on the Torino Process, a biennial initiative analysing Vocational Education and Training (VET) policies. The insights gained inform future policymaking in the field.

Under the leadership of MoES's VET Directorate, the 2019-2020 cycle was implemented nationwide, resulting in the ETF report on policies and recommendations for human capital development in Ukraine.

The new cycle of the Torino Process began in 2023, with the published report highlighting significant progress in Ukraine's VET system, including resource allocation, policy reforms, and modernization efforts. While excelling in VET program design and implementation, Ukraine faces challenges aligning outcomes with labour market needs. Addressing pedagogical weaknesses and expanding work-based learning opportunities could bridge this gap. Despite disruptions from the Russian invasion, the resilience of VET providers offers hope for post-war reconstruction efforts.

In the second half of 2024, the ETF will deliver the annual update of its Torino Process system performance monitoring report for Ukraine for that year.

4. Micro credentials

Micro-credentials in Ukraine are emerging as a vital tool for enhancing workforce skills and education. These short, focused courses provide flexible learning opportunities, allowing individuals to gain specific competencies and qualifications. This approach supports Ukraine's broader educational reforms and aligns with international standards, addressing immediate labour market needs and fostering continuous professional development.

Through the UA Re-Emerge(ncy) program, ETF is collecting materials in energy efficiency, construction, and green energy for the Dnipropetrovsk region, with plans to expand. The ETF is gathering professional e-learning materials from the EU and neighbouring countries to provide high-quality vocational education for Ukrainian learners, particularly focusing on internally displaced citizens in safe regions.

Micro-credentials are uploaded to the MoES VET e-learning platform for nationwide access.

5. Vocational excellence and Centres of Vocational Excellence

Ukraine is dedicated to enhancing vocational education through the establishment of centres of excellence across the country, in line with its ongoing reforms. This initiative is aimed at elevating the standard and applicability of vocational education, ultimately stimulating economic advancement and improving job opportunities for Ukrainian youth and reskilling and upskilling of adults.

The ETF has conducted research on public-private partnerships, decentralization of vocational education, and the establishment of centres of vocational excellence (CoVEs) and innovation.

Moreover, ETF is assisting Ukraine's Ministry of Education and Science in the development of CoVEs through ETFs global peer learning Network for Excellence, ENE. In this network, Ukrainian members play a leading role, particularly within the ENE's green VET partnership GRETA.

In the course of 2024, the ETF Network for Excellence will publish several volumes of a Comprehensive Report on Vocational Excellence including cases and practices from Ukrainian CoVEs.

6. Active Labour Market Programmes

ETF supports policy learning to reform upskilling and reskilling programs, promoting inclusivity and effectiveness. This includes cross-country exchanges in March 2023 on flexible learning's impact on ALMPs and a policy event in November 2023 focusing on inclusive employment support, especially gender and disability issues.

Similar exchanges will continue in 2024, addressing ALMP effectiveness in fragile contexts (Brussels, June 2024) and disability issues (Autumn 2024, TBD).

7. Civil Society Organisations

Ukraine has a large civil society sector, with a high number of civil society organizations (CSOs) compared to many other countries. This robust network of CSOs is instrumental in driving social change, promoting democratic values, and supporting community needs, particularly in times of conflict and crisis. The active participation of these organizations reflects the strong civic engagement and commitment to reform within Ukrainian society.

ETF carried out a mapping exercise in 2020 on CSOs and their role in the employment policy cycle.

In 2023, ETF organized workshops to foster collaboration between entities like EARLALL and the Poltava region for potential EU projects. Amid conflict, involving CSOs is vital for addressing local needs and rebuilding communities. ETF commits to continuing partnerships with local authorities and CSOs on lifelong learning to support Ukraine's recovery.

8. Career Guidance

Ukraine's career guidance system provides support, offering information and counselling to help individuals make informed career decisions, contributing to personal fulfilment and economic development. The ETF has completed national system reviews in Ukraine, providing priorities for action on service delivery standards and building up the capacity of career guidance.

UNICEF and ETF has jointly explored young people's needs for career guidance across 11 European and Central Asian countries, consulting over 9,600 adolescents. The research aims to inform better policies and highlights the unique challenges faced by young Ukrainians since the 2022 war. A comprehensive report was published in 2024.

In March 2024, Ukrainian representatives, and young people, along with counterparts from ETF Partner Countries, were invited to a Brussels event. The purpose was to discuss the findings of research and explore the implications of displacements and conflicts on career guidance services for young Ukrainians.

9. European Qualifications Framework

The ETF is actively involved in developing a data model for Ukrainian VET qualifications, ensuring alignment with the European Qualifications Framework (EQF) and mapping with ESCO. This effort aims to enhance transparency between EU member states and Ukraine's skills systems.

In February 2023, the report 'Comparison report of European Qualifications Framework and Ukrainian National Qualifications Framework' was published.



Additionally, the ETF assists in comparing qualifications frameworks and supports the National Qualifications Agency in operationalizing the National Qualifications Framework (NQF). Furthermore, they update the NQF inventory and enhance the resource hub to provide comprehensive information on job and education opportunities for Ukrainians.

10. Skills for smart specialisation strategies

Since 2020, the ETF has been engaged in Ukraine, focusing on productivity-enhancing skills in key areas for economic growth. The ETF carried out a foresight exercise in Rivne region in 2021 on the skills implications for the regional smart specialisation strategies in the wood-working and furniture manufacturing industry.

Initially piloted in Rivne and Kharkiv regions, this approach was interrupted by the Russian invasion. In the post-conflict landscape, the ETF collaborates with various stakeholders to identify technology and skills needs, aiming to drive innovation and recovery. This initiative aligns with EU membership aspirations and regional development strategies emphasizing smart specialization.

In 2024, the ETF plans to implement this approach in one pilot region and continue cooperation with the Joint Research Centre on adapting smart specialization tools to the post-conflict context.
